
RM OF ST. ANDREWS June 2019

The Waste Disposal Grounds get busier as the summer nears. In an effort to keep our landfills neat and tidy and running optimally, this newsletter is a reminder of the programs and recycling collection expectations.

- All loads must be properly secured and covered. By-Law Enforcement Officers will be checking and issuing fines as required.
- Garbage must be bagged prior to disposal. Loose garbage WILL NOT be accepted at the landfills.
- Landfills may be closed at the discretion of the custodian on days that

present safety risks to its users, i.e. storms or days with extremely high winds.

- Residents are reminded that they are entering the landfill at their own risk. The RM of St. Andrews is not responsible for any injury or damages while on site.
- For safety concerns, children and pets should remain in vehicles while visiting the landfill.
- Scavenging IS NOT permitted at the landfills.
- Residents that fail to comply with the rules while visiting the landfill can be either fined or banned from the landfill, at the discretion of the custodian.



In Manitoba, plastic bags are not accepted in recycling bins. Fortunately, many retailers in Manitoba accept used plastic bags. Remember, reduce your use of plastic bags; reuse "single use" bags for household garbage, pet waste and other items. Recycle unwanted bags in your home at your local retailer that accepts them. Empty the contents of your plastic bags into the recycle bins and reuse the bags to recycle more items. All clear and coloured plastic bags are NOT recyclable.

Flatten cardboard boxes and remove all Styrofoam. All types of Styrofoam are not recyclable.

The following is a list of some of the items that have been found in the RM of St. Andrews recycling bins recently that are not recyclable:
